Clayton County Says “Yes” to MARTA

On election night, Clayton County citizens voted overwhelming to join MARTA – by at least 74 percent according to the latest results – marking what will be the first jurisdictional expansion of the transit system since its inception more than 40 years ago.

“This is a historic moment for MARTA, Clayton County and the region,” said **MARTA Board Chair Robert L. Ashe III**. “On behalf of my fellow Board members, I want to thank the voters of Clayton County who have demonstrated their confidence in MARTA to deliver high-quality transit service to their community. We are humbled and grateful for the opportunity to prove once again that MARTA is well worth the public investment.”

Earlier this year, the Clayton County Commission voted to put the binding MARTA referendum on the November ballot. Many Clayton County residents had been clamoring to join MARTA after budget cuts forced the shutdown of the C-Tran bus system in 2010.

“Officially welcoming Clayton is an incredible anniversary present for MARTA as we continue to celebrate 35 years of combined bus and rail service in metro Atlanta,” said **MARTA GM/CEO Keith T. Parker**. “Starting as soon as March 2015, MARTA will bring affordable, reliable transit customer-focused service to the citizens of Clayton County.”

Clayton County Commission Chairman Jeffrey E. Turner said his constituents recognized that MARTA was a key to unlocking economic growth and improving the quality of life for their community.

“Public transit is the critical link we need to bring quality job opportunities to the citizens of Clayton County. This is the catalyst to bring significant development to the south side of the region over the next few years.”

Collection of the 1 percent sales levy will begin in March 2015, as would three bus routes and complementary transit servicing Clayton County. MARTA will host public hearings on proposed transit services in the expanded service area.

In the coming weeks, MARTA will request that elected officials in its current service area – Fulton and DeKalb Counties and the City of Atlanta – vote to approve the 14th Amendment to the Rapid Transit Contract and Assistance Agreement to include Clayton County.

The Clayton County Board of Commissioners will appoint two representatives to the MARTA Board of Directors.

Clayton County FAQ

Q. Will a portion of Clayton County's tax revenues be placed in an escrow account for future rail service or a high-capacity transit option?

A. Yes. The binding contract between MARTA and Clayton County has a special provision that initially keeps those funds separate for that purpose.

Q. Is MARTA only going to put its older buses in Clayton County?

A. MARTA is now replacing the majority of its bus fleet. A mix of older and newer buses would be used across the service area, including Clayton County.

Q. Is Clayton County going to pay a higher fare than the current MARTA customers?

A. Everyone will pay the same fare to ride MARTA, no matter where they're from.

Q. Will Clayton County have a voice on MARTA's Board of Directors?

A. Yes. Clayton County will get two voting members on the MARTA Board, if the referendum passes. Clayton County Commissioners will appoint Board representatives who would start their terms in January 2015.

Q. Will citizens have a voice in the final Clayton County MARTA service?

A. Yes. By law, MARTA must have public hearings before adding or eliminating service or changing fares. MARTA will hold public hearings in Clayton County to get your input before the service plan is finalized.

Q. Will Clayton County ever have more than buses?

A. Yes. MARTA will continue to explore high-capacity transit options for Clayton County, including commuter rail or bus-rapid transit.

Q. When will Clayton County have bus service?

A. By March 2015, Clayton County will have limited bus service. New routes will continue to be added with full bus service available by July 2016.

Q. Will Clayton County citizens pay the MARTA penny forever?

A. As a full member of the transit system, Clayton County's contract would run for 30 years, until 2044.

Proposed Bus Service Modifications for March 21, 2015

Proposed routing and/or segment adjustments for the following bus routes:

Route 1 - Centennial Olympic Park/Coronet Way: This route is proposed to terminate at North Avenue Station. The segments along Luckie Street (between Ivan Allen Jr. Blvd. and Pine Street), Centennial Olympic Park Drive (between North Avenue & Pine Street and Ivan Allen Jr. Blvd. & Marietta Street), Ivan Allen Jr. Blvd. (between Centennial Olympic Park Drive & Spring Street), Spring Street, Marietta Street, Forsyth Street, Alabama Street, Peachtree Street, and Martin Luther King Jr. Drive will be discontinued. The route will be renamed Route 1 – North Avenue/Coronet Way.

Route 15 – South DeKalb/Candler Road: The trips that currently terminate at GA Perimeter College will be extended along Panthersville Road past River Road to Left - Bouldercrest Road, Right - Forest Parkway, Right - Grant Road, Right - Anvil Block Road which will be the new terminus. The Route 15 extension will be renamed **Route 15 - Candler Road/South DeKalb/Forest Parkway**. Service along River Road, Linecrest Road, and Clevemont Road remains unchanged.

Route 16 – Noble: This route is **proposed** to terminate at Civic Center Station. The segments along Courtland Street, Peachtree Center Avenue, Auburn Avenue, Peachtree Street, Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, Broad Street, and Alabama Street will be discontinued.

Route 55 – Jonesboro Road/Hutchens Road: This route will be extended from Conley Road and Jonesboro Road south along Jonesboro Road to Forest Parkway turnaround in Clayton County. The segment along Jonesboro Road between Hutchens Road and Conley Road will be discontinued. The segment along Hutchens Road, Forrest Park Road, and Conley Road will be provided bi-directional service. This route will be renamed **Route 55 – Jonesboro Road/Hutchens Road/Forest Parkway**.

Route 74 – Flat Shoals: This route is proposed to be extended to terminate on Rainbow Way and Candler Road via Ember Drive. The route will operate alternating service (every other trip) via Flat Shoals Road and Whites Mill Road to the new terminus location. Additionally, this route is proposed to terminate at King Memorial Station. The segments along Lloyd Road, Cavalier Drive, Jamestown Way, Williamsburg Drive, Williamsburg Way, Memorial Drive, Capitol Avenue, Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, Broad Street, Alabama Street, Peachtree Street, and Mitchell Street will be discontinued.

Route 84 – East Point/Camp Creek: This route will operate a short turn alignment between East Point Station and Camp Creek Market Place on weekdays until approximately 8:00 p.m. and Saturdays until approximately 9:00 p.m. The short turn alignment will provide service to the Social Security Administration Office on weekdays instead of Route 82 - Camp Creek/Welcome. The service frequency will be reduced to the Camp Creek Parkway (between Princeton Lakes Pkwy. & Old Fairburn Rd.), Old Fairburn Road, Fairburn Road, N. Camp Creek Pkwy, and Hogan Road segments during this time. Sunday service remains unchanged with all trips operating from East Point Station to

N. Camp Creek Parkway.

Route 196 – College Park/Church/Upper Riverdale/Mt. Zion: This new route will originate from College Park Station South Bus Bay, Interstate 85 South to Interstate 285 East, Riverdale Road Exit, then Riverdale Road, Garden Walk Blvd., Highway 85 (SR 85), Main Street (S.R. 139), Church Street, Highway 85 (S.R. 85), Lamar Hutcheson Pkwy. to GRTA Park/Ride, continue Lamar Hutcheson Pkwy., Upper Riverdale Rd, Tara Blvd., Mt. Zion Rd. to Southlake Mall terminus.

Mobility: Implement complementary ADA service for the above new and extended routes to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.





**Clayton Schools Superintendent to attend White House Education Summit
*Luvenia Jackson among 3 Georgia superintendents to be invited***

Ms. Luvenia Jackson, superintendent of Clayton County Public Schools, has been selected by the U.S. Department of Education as one of 120 top school leaders from across America to participate in the [National Connected Superintendents Summit](#) Wednesday, Nov. 19 hosted by President Obama at the White House.

In June 2013, President Obama announced the [ConnectED Initiative](#), starting with a goal of connecting 99 percent of students to next-generation connectivity within five years. Model schools and districts across the country are using technology to create personalized learning environments; technology will play an increasingly crucial role in the future.

Superintendent Jackson is one of three exemplary Georgia school superintendents who will be recognized for their leadership in helping transition their districts to digital learning. This unique conference will bring together officials from throughout America to share with one another and the U.S. Department of Education promising to use technology to transform teaching and learning approaches to instruction that are student-centered.

"I am honored and humbled to have been selected to represent Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS), as one of 120 school superintendents in the nation, to lead capacity building for education technology," said Ms. Jackson. "For CCPS, this important endeavor began with a solid foundation of technology infrastructure. The CCPS vision for technology is to have both

teachers and students engaged, on a daily basis, through the use of digital learning tools,” she continued. “Technology is a tool that has made and will continue to make a positive impact on our students’ achievement. Through the use of technology, student engagement increases and a student’s learning becomes more personalized. Integrating technology into the curriculum allows students more opportunity to create, share, think critically, and become high achievers.”

“School districts across the country are helping teachers harness the power of technology to create personal learning environments for all students,” said [U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan](#). “We want to make sure every child – whether he or she is in the inner-city, in a rural community or on a Native American reservation – has access to knowledge and the chance to learn 24 hours a day, seven days a week.”

The White House summit will be followed by a series of 12-15 regional summits that will focus on the digital progress that has been made and is still possible by local school districts. The events will also include the unveiling of digital tools that facilitate infusion of technology into short-term and long-range education planning.

To help spotlight the value of technology in schools, the Education Department is sponsoring a Future Ready Initiative aimed at showcasing outstanding school leadership and strategies. “The Future Ready Initiative highlights the critical role of district leaders in setting a vision and creating the environment where educators and students access the tools, content, and expertise necessary for thriving in a connected world,” said Richard Culatta, director of the Department’s Office of Educational Technology.

Future Ready superintendents demonstrate effective use of technology in some of the following ways:

- Fostering and leading a culture of digital learning within our schools;
- Helping schools and families transition to high-speed connectivity;
- Empowering educators through professional learning opportunities;
- Accelerating progress toward universal access for all students to quality devices;
- Providing access to quality digital content;
- Offering digital tools to help students and families Reach Higher;
- Mentoring other districts and helping them transition to digital learning.

“Technology has the potential to transform education in America, allowing students to learn more, to do so at their own pace, and to develop the knowledge and skills employers demand,” Culatta said. “And yet, fewer than 30 percent of classrooms have the broadband internet to support today’s education technology needs.”

Don't Pour Grease Down the Drain

Fats, Oils and Grease (also known as F.O.G.) enter your plumbing system through kitchen sinks, dishwashers, garbage disposals and toilets. Once inside, F.O.G. coats your plumbing drain pipes and can clog the sewer system. This leads to costly sanitary sewer overflows or sewer backups into your home or business.

Where does F.O.G. come from?

F.O.G. comes from meat fats, cooking oil, dairy products, shortening, butter, margarine, food scraps and sauces that are scraped or poured down the drain or disposal.

How should I dispose of F.O.G.?

- Allow F.O.G. to cool. Pour fats, oils and grease into a sealed container and place in your household garbage.
- Wipe and scrape all food scraps from plates, pots, pans and utensils into the trash before washing.
- Put all greasy paper towels in the garbage.
